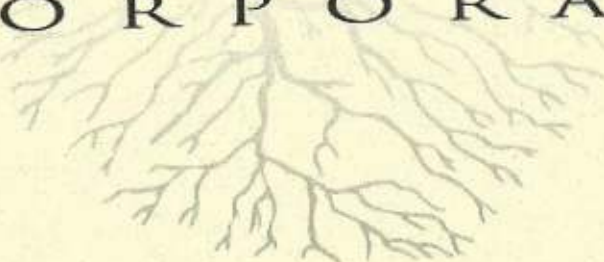

OBJECTIVES

- Report on correspondence received from our agent in England.
- Pursue recommendations made in previous reports.

RESULTS

- Identified christenings for two children of the Reverend Giles Whiting who were both christened in Panfield, Essex, where Giles served as rector from 1582 to 1587. The christenings provide a better framework on which to estimate the birth years of Giles's other children.
- Learned that a Francis Whiting lived about seven miles from Giles Whiting in Essex. He could have possibly been the brother that Giles mentioned in his will.
- Located a record concerning John Whiting, his wife Margaret, and their family. This John was born about 1607 and lived as an adult in St. Bartholomew the Great Parish in London. According to this document, the Whiting coat of arms used by Giles Whiting decorated John's tomb; the Shipham coat of arms was above the tomb. This information provides some evidence that the Reverend John Whiting (who presumably married Dorcas Shipham as his first wife) did in fact have at least one son, not just the three daughters credited to him in heraldic visitations and in his will. If the Reverend John Whiting was the father of the John Whiting buried in St. Bartholomew's, then the Reverend may also have been the father of the immigrant William Whiting.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Seek more information about the John Whiting who was buried in St. Bartholomew the Great Church in London. Strive to find a probate record for him that may identify his parentage or siblings.
- Strive to find marriages for the three daughters of the Reverend John Whiting (Dorcas, Elizabeth, and Katherine). Then look for probate records for these three women and their husbands to learn if any siblings are mentioned. (Note: it is possible that Katherine was the same Catherine Whiting who married Thomas Wiggins.)
- Identify the parents and siblings of Dorcas Shipham, the presumed first wife of the Reverend John Whiting. Learn if her parents or siblings left wills that may have mentioned the children of Dorcas.

- Examine the Carew probate records identified during this project. The objective is to learn if anyone mentioned Giles Whiting, his wife, or his children.

The objectives of this project were to (1) report on correspondence received from our agent in England and (2) pursue recommendations made in previous reports.

Children of Giles Whiting

Our agent in Essex, England, searched the registers of Panfield Parish in Essex for Whiting entries dated 1570 to 1700. He noted only two entries, but both were baptisms for children of Giles Whiting.¹ These christenings provide a better framework on which to estimate the birth years of Giles's other children. Both christenings have been added to the database.

- Chr 8 Nov 1583 – Sarah, daught'r of Giles Whiting
- Chr 18 Mar 1585/6 – Nathaniell, son of Giles Whiting

Christenings for children of Giles Whiting who were born prior to 1583 were sought in the FamilySearch "England, Essex Parish Registers, 1538-1900" database in the hope that they too may have been born in Essex. But this search produced no positive results for children of Giles. However, it was very interesting to note that seven miles away in Castle Hedingham Parish, a Francis Whiting christened a daughter Sarah on 26 February 1583/4 and a son Nathaniel on March 1587/8. Both christenings were relatively close in time to the christenings of Giles's two children of the same names. Francis also christened a son whom he named Giles in 1599. The will of the Reverend Giles Whiting mentioned a brother Francis. The discovery of the Francis Whiting of Castle Hedingham, Essex, introduced a second candidate to have been Giles's brother Francis. The first

candidate was the Francis Whiting of Croft, Lincolnshire, who christened a son William on 8 March 1600/1. This date was close to the time when the ancestral William was thought to have been born. The Francis Whiting of Croft was studied further in this project.

A marriage for Francis Whiting of Croft was not found in Lincolnshire. The registers of Croft Parish were searched, and christenings for four children of Francis were located.² The immigrant William supposedly had a sister Catherine who married Thomas Wiggins. From what was seen in the Croft registers, Francis Whiting did not have a daughter named Catherine.

- Chr 8 Mar 1600 – William, son Francis Whiting
- Chr 10 Oct 1602 – Agnes, dau Francis Whiting
- Chr 30 Sep 1604 – Samuel and Nathaniel, sons of Francis Whiting

Other Whiting events were recorded in Croft. Robert Whiting, Augustine Whiting, and Leonard Whiting all christened children here in the late 1590s and early 1600s. A William Whiting and Margaret Ballard married here on 17 June 1595 but christened no children in Croft. Probate records were sought for these Whiting men, as they might reveal a connection to Giles Whiting. A will was found for Robert Whiting who christened daughters Ann and Jane, and sons Robert and Mathias, in Croft between 1590 and 1599. Robert's will proved that he was the brother of Francis Whiting of Croft.

- **To Robert Whiting and William Whiting, my brother Francis' sons [minors]**
- Son Matthias Whiting is the executor
- Witnesses: Francis Whiting, Richard Rawson, William Cragg, William Whitinge

Robert's will proved that William, the son of Francis Whiting who was christened in 1600, was still alive and living in the Croft area as of 1619. But Robert's will did not mention a brother Giles, which could have clearly defined the Francis Whiting of Croft as the brother of the Reverend Giles Whiting.

Archive Catalog Searches

Information concerning the children of Giles Whiting was sought in The National Archives "Access to Archives" database, The National Archives online catalog, and the Essex Record Office online catalog called "Seax." Nothing was found concerning Giles or his sons, with the exception of his son Robert. Three deeds naming Robert Whiting of East Ham Parish were located.

- D/DB 422 (deed) conveyance of 13 acres of marsh ground in the marsh of "levill" called East Ham Marsh of East Ham, abutting east on land of Sir Henry Holcroft kt., called Wye Leas – from Robert Whitting of East Ham, gent., to George Barrett of London, cooper. 27 March 1634.
- D/DB 429 (deed: assignment of lease for 31 years of 2 April 1634) – Judith Whyting of East Ham (widow and executrix of Robert Whyting) to Samuel Orton of London, innholder – 13 acres of marsh ground....
- D/DB 424 (deed: counterpart assignment of leases for 40 years of 13 October 1601 and 21 years of 20 April 1612) John Allam, etc. and Robert Whyting of East Ham, gent., to Isaac Bringhurst, etc.

Acquisition of these deeds would add historical information about Robert and Judith Whiting, but would not likely help to identify the parents of the ancestral William Whiting who would not have been their son, since Robert was born too late to have been the father of a child born about 1600.

Chancery court indexes available on the National Archives website were also searched for Whitings. Many Whiting entries were listed, but most included only the surnames of the main plaintiff and defendant, with no indication of the county of residence. The only way to know if these entries involved the Whitings of interest would be to examine the documents relating to each case—a daunting, time-consuming task that would be expensive and perhaps fruitless. A few of the chancery entries did include the county or first names of the parties. None of these entries were of interest except for one reference to an inquisition post mortem for Robert Whiting of Essex dated 1637-1638.⁴ An inquisition post mortem was a local investigation into the lands of a deceased person of social or financial status in order to determine what income and legal rights were due to the monarch. The date range of the documents produced by this case was 27 March 1638 to 26 March 1639. Since the will of Giles's son Robert was probated on 17 October 1637, this inquisition post mortem likely applied to him. An abstract of this inquisition was sought in Philip Morant's publication, *The History and Antiquities of the County of Essex: compiled from the best and most ancient historians, from domesday- book, inquisitions post mortem and other the most valuable records and mss. &c, the whole digested, improved, perfected and brought down to the present time* (London: T. Osborne, 1768). However, Robert Whiting's inquisition was not included in this publication.

Comparison of Visitations

The 1634 Visitation of Essex⁵ and the 1619 Visitation of Leicester⁶ were examined and reported in a previous project. These documents were reexamined during this project for any additional clues that might suggest a particular direction in which to focus research.

Both pedigrees provided the same description of the Whiting coat of arms used by Giles Whiting and his descendants. Both pedigrees traced the family back to Giles Whiting, which indicates that Giles was the original grantee. Therefore, since the ancestral William Whiting's son William used this particular coat of arms, it clearly identifies William as a direct descendant of the Reverend Giles Whiting.

Both pedigrees provided the same birth order for Giles's sons—John (the heir), then Timothy, Nathaniel, and youngest son Robert. Christenings found for sons Nathaniel and Robert, 1586 and 1593 respectively, meant that John and Timothy were likely born in the mid- to late 1570s or early 1580s. Therefore, only these two sons were of a sufficient age to have had a child about 1600 (the ancestral William's estimated birth year). Timothy's sons, according to the 1619 Visitation of Leicester, were John, age 9 in 1619, Timothy, age 6 in 1619, and Nathaniell, age 4 in 1619. There was no mention of a son William. The children of Giles's son John by his wife Dorcas Shipham were all daughters according to this same pedigree. Something doesn't add up right. Since William must have been Giles's descendant to legally use his coat of arms, to whom did he belong?

The largest discrepancy between the two pedigrees was the name and county of origin for Giles's wife. Both pedigrees agreed that her surname was Carew, but the Leicester pedigree stated she was Maria Carew of Essex; the Essex pedigree named her as Margerie Carew of Suffolk. Her burial entry found in Etton's parish registers clearly identified her as Margerie. In this respect, the Essex pedigree was more correct.

Carew

The two visitations agreed that Giles Whiting had married a woman with the surname of Carew, but they did not agree as to her given name. The thought was that if the family of Giles's wife could be identified and studied, perhaps their probate records could shed some light on William Whiting. Since Giles may have married in Essex, his marriage was sought in databases containing extracted Essex church registers. Nothing was found. A search of the Essex Record Office catalog did not produce Carew entries, and a clergyman surnamed Carew who served in the areas of Essex and Northampton where Giles served could not be found either.

The probate index to the Commissary Court of the Diocese of London, Essex and Hertfordshire division, was searched for the Carew surname, and several entries were located for Carews of Romford. Perhaps these could be pursued in the future. But as Romford is not close to Panfield where Giles served as rector, they were noted but not examined at this time. The Prerogative Court of Canterbury probate index listed five Carew testators for Essex, one of which was for a testator of East Ham where Giles's son Robert Whiting lived.

- 1602 – William Carewe, yeoman of East Ham, Essex
- 1591 – Roger Carewe of Brightlingsea, Essex
- 1640 – Anthony Carew of Hornchurch, Essex
- 1617 – Margaret Carew of Shenfield, Essex
- 1651 – Mathew Carew, innholder of Bocking, Essex

The will of William Carewe was examined and it was hoped that he would mention the Whitings. He did not.

The remaining Carew wills identified should be examined in the future.

Other Sources

The Whitings were sought in the Victoria County History publications for Essex and Northampton, but not a single Whiting entry was located in the indexes to the appropriate volumes.

Whittings were also sought in state papers and other documents found on the British History Online website. The following four entries were found.

We therefore prepared an address, and appointed an attorney to represent us in case of legal proceedings. The most interesting entry was the one found in the records of St. Bartholomew's Priory and St. Bartholomew the Great Church of London. This entry contained

information about a John Whiting who was born about 1607. The evidence suggests that this John may have been a son of the Reverend John Whiting by his wife Dorcas Shipham. If true, then despite what is shown on the Essex and Leicestershire Visitations, the Reverend John Whiting did in fact have at least one son by his first wife.

John and Margaret Whiting, 1681, 1680. In the centre bay in the north ambulatory is a marble monument consisting of a square tablet in a foliated frame with three festoons below, in the centre one of which is a shield with some traces of arms. Above the tablet are three shields with arms, and over the centre one is a helmet and crest. The tablet is thus inscribed:

Neare this place lye buried the bodies of
John Whiting and Margaret his
wife who lived lovingly together
in holy wedlock in this parish 40
yeares and upward and dyed in peace
the said Margaret dyed on Easter
day 1680 in the 61st yeare of her age and He
dyed the 16th day of July 1681 being 74 yeares
old having had issue 12 children John
Rebecca and Sarah onely surviving.

Johannes in memoriam optimorum parentum hoc monumentum posuit.
Shee first deceased, Hee for a little Tryd
To live without her, likd it not and dyd.

The centre shield above has carved: Smalpace, Sable an inescutcheon within an orle of martlets or, and the crest an heraldic antelope trippant argent supporting a broken spear-head point downward or. To the left hand an emblazoned shield quarterly, I and IV, Shipham, or, a cinquefoil between six cross crosslets fitchée ... II. Sable a saltire argent (the colours doubtful). III. ... a chief ... (?)sa ... The shield to the right has I and IV Smalpace as above, the colours only partly remaining; II and III. ... a bend or, impaling the quarterly coat on the left side. On the shield at the foot of the monument there can be just traced three roundels in chief; we may therefore conclude that it is the coat of Whiting, viz. Per saltire azure

and ermine a leopard's face or and in chief three bezants. (The Rev. John Whiting, S.T.P., rector of St. Martin's Vintry, married a daughter of Shipham.) There is a large freestone shield over this monument, but it does not belong to it, and the arms are quite obliterated from the crumbling surface.

The last two lines of the inscription are adapted from those written in 1625 by Sir Henry Wotton on the death of the wife of Sir Albert Morton, which begin 'He first deceased', &c.

John Whiting lived in Long Lane, where he had a house with seven hearths, for which, in the year 1661, he paid £44 a year rent.

He appears in the Vestry Minute Books from 1666 to 1676 as signing the minutes with Thos. Roycroft and others. He was buried in the church on the 20th July (1681), and as he was buried in linen his executors paid £2 10s. to the churchwarden for the use of the poor. His widow Margaret was buried here, also in linen, on the 15th April 1680, but her Christian name has not been entered in the register.

The parish registers show that all his twelve children were baptized at the church. His son John, who erected this monument, endowed the parish schools and is commemorated by a tablet in the quire. His son James, who died in 1676, and 'seven of his brethren' also had a memorial stone in the floor, which has now disappeared.

Christening records were sought for the children of John and Margaret Whiting at St. Bartholomew the Great in London. Eleven entries were found.

- 1641 – John
- 1643 – Francis
- 1644 – Francis
- 1646 – Rebecca
- 1648 – Sara
- 1651 – James
- 1653 – Thomas
- 1655 – Samuel and Francis
- 1657 – Gabrill
- 1659 – Thomas

If the John Whiting who married Margaret was indeed the son of the Reverend John Whiting (which is highly suggested by the coat of arms that decorated his tomb and the area above the tomb), then he and any other siblings may not have been mentioned in the will of their father or the will of their grandfather because they were provided for before John married his second wife Katherine.

But the question arises, since the Reverend John Whiting died prior to William's departure from England, why would William Whiting leave money to his father and mother in his will? One can only speculate. Perhaps the "father and mother" were actually his stepparents or his in-laws.

A pedigree found on the FindMyPast website in Boyd's London Burials database lists the John Whiting of St. Bartholomew the Great who died in 1681.⁸ But the information differs as to this John's birth date. This pedigree (source unknown) claims that the John Whiting who was buried in 1681 was born in 1639. This cannot be correct since the burial information noted above states that John was 74 when he died in 1681. This pedigree also claims that John was the son of John Whiting, a yeoman of Surrey, who died in 1631. This information does not match with the coats of arms found on and above John's tomb.

It is recommended that the will of the John Whiting who died in 1681 be found to learn what clues about his parentage it would provide.

Conclusion

If the ancestral William Whiting's son, William Whiting Jr., used the coat of arms of Giles Whiting legally (and it must be assumed that this was the case), then it stands to reason that the immigrant William Whiting was a direct descendant of the Reverend Giles Whiting. Giles's two younger sons, Nathaniel and Robert, were born too late to have been the father of William who was born about 1600. The children of Giles's son Timothy have been pretty well documented. That leaves only Giles's oldest son and heir, the Reverend John Whiting, as a possible father of William Whiting the immigrant.

The Essex and Leicestershire heraldic visitations show John Whiting with just three daughters—the same daughters mentioned in John's will and in the will of Giles

Whiting. However, these two visitations name John's wife as Dorcas Shipham. John's will clearly indicates that his wife at his death was named Katherine, not Dorcas. Therefore, it was speculated during a previous project that John may have had two wives and that he settled with the children by his first wife prior to his second marriage and that this was the reason why his second wife Katherine and three daughters were named in his will.

The information found during this project concerning the John Whiting of St. Bartholomew the Great Parish adds support to the theory that the Reverend John Whiting may have married twice and that he had children by both wives. Although the document does not state that the John Whiting who died in 1681 was the son of the Reverend John Whiting, it does imply that this was the case by describing the Whiting and Shipham coats of arms that would have been used by descendants of the Reverend John Whiting and his wife Dorcas Shipham.

Recommendations

- Seek more information about the John Whiting who was buried in St. Bartholomew the Great Church in London. Strive to find a probate record for him that may identify his parentage or siblings.
- Strive to find marriages for the three daughters of the Reverend John Whiting (Dorcas, Elizabeth, and Katherine). - Examine the Carew probate records identified during this project. The objective is to learn if anyone mentioned Giles Whiting, his wife, or his children.

He christened a son William in 1600, a daughter Agnes in 1602, and sons Samuel and Nathaniel in 1604. He had a brother Robert whose will was proved in 1620. Robert mentioned two children of his brother Francis--Robert and William. Robert did not mention a brother Giles. The second Francis Whiting candidate to be the brother of Giles Whiting was the Francis Whiting found in Castle Hedingham, Essex, which is about 7 miles away from Panfield where Giles served as rector in the 1580s. This Francis had multiple children including a son whom he named Giles.

Johannes in memoriam optimorum parentum hoc monumentum posuit. Shee first deceased, Hee for a little Tryd To live without her, likd it not and dyd.

The centre shield above has carved: Smalpace, Sable an inescutcheon within an orle of martlets or, and the crest an heraldic antelope trippant argent supporting a broken spear-head point downward or. To the left hand an emblazoned shield quarterly, I and IV, Shipham, or, a cinquefoil between six cross crosslets fitchée ... II. Sable a saltire argent (the colours doubtful). III. ... a chief ... (?)sa ... The shield to the right has I and IV Smalpace as above, the colours only partly remaining; II and III. ... a bend or, impaling the quarterly coat on the left side. On the shield at the foot of the monument there can be just traced three roundels in chief; we may therefore conclude that it is the coat of Whiting, viz. Per saltire azure and ermine a leopard's face or and in chief three bezants. (The Rev. John Whiting, S.T.P., rector of St. Martin's Vintry, married a daughter of Shipham.) There is a large freestone shield over this monument, but it does not belong to it, and the arms are quite obliterated from the crumbling surface.

The last two lines of the inscription are adapted from those written in 1625 by Sir Henry Wotton on the death of the wife of Sir Albert Morton, which begin 'He first deceased', &c.

John Whiting lived in Long Lane, where he had a house with seven hearths, for which, in the year 1661, he paid £44 a year rent.

He appears in the Vestry Minute Books from 1666 to 1676 as signing the minutes with Thos. Roycroft and others. He was buried in the church on the 20th July (1681), and as he was buried in linen his executors paid £2 10s. to the churchwarden for the use of the poor. His widow Margaret was buried here, also in linen, on the 15th April 1680, but her Christian name has not been entered in the register.

The parish registers show that all his twelve children were baptized at the church. His son John, who erected this monument, endowed the parish schools and is commemorated by a tablet in the quire. His son James, who died in 1676, and 'seven of his brethren' also had a memorial stone in the floor, which has now disappeared."

If this is accurate, then the John who died in 1681 would likely be the son of the Reverend John Whiting and his wife Dorcas Shipham since both coats of arms were on or above their tomb. This would mean that the Reverend John Whiting did have at least one son. (Heraldic visitations credited him with only three daughters.) The Reverend John Whiting and his father Giles mentioned only John's three daughters in their wills. Perhaps John had his son John (about 1607) and perhaps a son William (about 1600) by his first wife and did not mention them in his will because he settled with them before he remarried. Possible, but still needs to be proven or disproven.

1. William migrated from England to Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1633 with Thomas Wiggins. Wiggins had been in America before. Another source says that William first came to Cambridge in 1631 and later was an original settler of Hartford (New England Register vol. 103 pg 35).
2. An original settler at Hartford in 1636. He came to Hartford with Thomas Hooker, a reverend with the Puritans. Both William Whiting and Thomas Hooker were nonconformists. William was a wealthy merchant dealing with grain from America to England. He had a trading house on the Delaware River and at Westfield and had dealings with Virginia. He owned land in Connecticut and New Hampshire.
3. Dep. from Hartford to Connecticut General Court, 1637; a member of the General Court in 1637.
4. In 1638 he was allowed to trade with the Indians and in 1642 appointed to collect tribute of the Indians on Long Island and on the mainlands.
5. In 1640 William was admitted as a freeman. In 1644 he was listed as a merchant. In 1645 he became the constable in Hartford.
6. William served as the second colonial treasurer of Connecticut 1641-1647.
7. William was a Major in the colonial forces.
8. William served as commissioner of the United Colonies for Connecticut 1646-7.
9. William was a leading man in the Connecticut colony and was of a gentleman's status. He was a man of wealth and prominence. His estate at his decease was worth 9000 pounds sterling. He made several trips to England.
10. William made his will on 20 March 1643. Codicils were added on 2 April 1646 and on 24 July 1647. (William amended his wills before his voyages at sea to England.) The codicils indicate he had other children since the making of his original will. The will was recorded on 24 April 1649. William named his children as William, John, Samuel, Sarah, Mary, and Joseph. Joseph was likely born after the initial will was made as he was not mentioned in it; he was provided for in a codicil. William had a "sister Wiggins" who had children. He also gave money to Margery Parker, Mr. Hopkins, Mr. Webster, to the children of Mr. Hooker, to the children of Mr. Stone, to the poor of Hartford, to the town of Hartford, to the poor of Windsor, to the poor of Wethersfield. Mrs. Whiting had the will probated on 2 September 1647. William left money to his father and mother (in his 1643 will) if they were still living, and if not, the money was to go to his brother. The parents and brother were not named. On 29 October 1647 Mrs. Susanna (Whiting) Fitch by an instrument of resignation dated 27 June 1662 resigned her interest in the estate of Mr. William Whiting, deceased. On 5 October 1654, Mr. Webster, Mr. Stone, Mr. Fitch, Mr. William Whiting, Mr. John Whiting, presented to the court a distribution of Mr. Whiting's estate agreed upon by them.

11. William was a man of wealth and education, one of the most respectable settlers in 1636 and one of the civil and religious fathers of Connecticut.

12. He was closely associated with George Wyllys and Thomas Wiggin.

13. Searches made by James Cunningham in England in 1949 - Deptford St. Nicholas, Kent 1592 to 1600 - produced no trace of William Whiting. He did find the marriage of John Whiting and Margaret Bonner on 22 December 1586 in Boston, Lincolnshire. According to the will of this John Whiting, he did not have a son William. The researcher stated that it is possible that the Whiting family was in Boston, Lincoln before the registers began.

14. A researcher located in the Bishop of Lincoln probate court a will dated 21 October 1617 (1617, i, folio 239) for John Whiting the elder of Boston, woollendraper. John named a daughter Margaret, wife of Richard Carter; wife Isabell who receives his house in Boston; son James; son Samuel who was at Cambridge; son John; daughter Awdree, wife of Robert Wright. John is the eldest son. His son James is not yet 23. John marked, not signed, the will. Proved on 31 Oct 1617. Witnessed by William Whiting. No son William or daughter Catherine.

15. A William Whiting of Boston also left a will dated 1618. He christened a son William at Boston in 1602. The child christened in 1602 cannot be the emigrant because he would have known that his father was dead when he wrote his own will in 1643. However, he could be related. William's 1618 will stated that he was a woollen draper of Boston, had a wife Margaret, youngest son Isaac (minor), son Robert, son William, brother Francis Whiting, and cousins John Whiting and Richard Carter. The researcher assumed that the John Whiting who died in 1617 (the father of the emigrant Samuel Whiting) and the William Whiting who died in 1618/9 were brothers. However, William's 1618 will says that John is his cousin. "There was another brother Francis who may have had children and no doubt there were many other Whitings nearly related. The name occurs frequently in Lincolnshire probate courts." (Letter dated 18 June 1958)

16. William Whiting was using a similar coat of arms as John Whiting from Boston, Lincolnshire and John's son, the Reverend Samuel Whiting who migrated to New England and lived at Lynn, Massachusetts. Therefore, there is likely a connection between the ancestral William and these Whiting men of Boston, Lincolnshire. Several letters written by William Jr., his son, are sealed with a coat of arms which are a variation of those used by the family of Whitings of Boston, Lincoln. The coat of arms is described in "Roll of Arms" registered by Committee of Heraldry, New England Historical and Genealogical Society. Major William Whiting, original proprietor of Hartford, liv. 1687 - azure a leopard face gold between two flaunches ermine in chief 3 bezants; crest a demi-eagle displayed with two heads proper (New England Register vol. 106 pg. 258). The family's coat of arms were quartered at a Chantry of St. Lawrence at Leake, which is not far from Boston, Lincolnshire. Gordon C. Whiting's book includes a graphic of the coat of arms for Thomas Whiting (1400s) and his descendants in Leicestershire and Essex (page 35). It is very similar to the coat of arms claimed by William Whiting (page 55). See Heraldic Journal, volume 1, pages 61, 160.

17. William was possibly living near his sister Catherine in London at the time she married in 1633 and returned to America with her and her husband in 1633.

18. Researcher in England found the Whiting surname popular in St. Magnus the Martyr parish in London. But no Catherine Whiting was listed.

19. A marriage found for a William and Susan Whiting. "William Whiting of St. Mary Magdalene Canterbury, woollendraper, bachelor, 23, son of William Whiting, Alderman of Canterbury, who consents, and Susan Sabin, virgin, 17, dau of Alvert Sabin, Alderman of Canterbury, who also consents. To marry at St. Mary Bredman's Canterbury." William was christened on 2 April 1615 at St. Mary Magdalene, son of William. He had a sister Katherine christened on 19 Sep 1619. But the William and Susan Whiting who married in Canterbury also christened children in Canterbury down to 1653 and cannot, therefore, be the ancestors who were in America by 1633. (Letter dated 18 June 1958)

20. The 1648 will of James Whiting of Boston, woollen draper was examined. He named his wife Mary, son John (minor), son Samuel (minor), brother Samuel Whiting now in New England, sister Wright, brother John Whiting. So he was the son of the John Whiting who wrote the 1617 will.

21. A researcher stated he checked subsidy and assessment lists for London and found a William Whiting living on Thames Street in St. Michael Queenhithe parish in 1638 [but the ancestral William was in New England then]. The researcher thought this could be the ancestor. Another person of interest was Samuel Whiteing of St. Magnus parish which adjoined and was later absorbed with St. Margaret New Fish Street. The registers of St. Michael Queenhithe do not start until October 1653. (Letter dated 27 June 1958) Samuel Whiting of St. Magnus parish was a freeman of the Fishmongers' Company and was a member of the City of London Livery Companies in 1641. A William Whiting was a freeman of the Blacksmiths' Company. A Joseph, son of Samuel Whiting, attained freeman status in the Fishmonger's Company in 1651. This Samuel Whiting could be the same man who christened 11 children in St. Magnus the Martyr parish. The researcher searched the records of the Fishmongers' Company. He thought that the William Whiting admitted to the Freedom in 1621 was likely the emigrant and that William was a brother of Samuel (whose family was in St. Magnus parish). The lead led to a search in Stroud, Gloucester. The "Register of Apprenticeship Bindings &

Admissions to the Freedom, 1614-1668" for the Fishmongers' Company of London included: 18 June 1621 William Whitinge, late apprentice to John Whitinge, claiming his freedom by service, is admitted and sworn; 15 November 1619 Samuel Whitynge, late apprentice to John Cole, claiming his freedom by service, is admitted and sworn; 29 November 1624 Thomas Whiteinge, son of Thomas Whiting of the Stroud Water in Gloucester, yeoman, put himself apprentice to Thomas Roberts fishmonger for nine years from michaelmas last 1624. The researcher searched Stroud parish (which is incomplete before 1640) and Painswick in Gloucester. He found a William christened in 1622; no Catherine. He studied wills for Whiting testators of the Stroud and Painswick area. Nothing.

22. A John Dumbleton may have been a servant of William Whiting for two years before coming to New England and then for another 4 or 5 years in New England (History of Windsor, CT pg. 49, 155).

23. Longden's "Northamptonshire and Rutland Clergy" include information about Samuel, son of the John Whiting of Boston, Lincolnshire, who left the 1617 will. The bio for Samuel stated he was the son of John Whiting, merchant of Boston, Lincoln and was christened there on 21 November 1597. Graduated from Emmanuel College at Cambridge. Ordained a priest in 1621 at Peterborough. Served as a minister at Lynn, Norfolk and rector of Skirbeck, Lincoln, in 1625. Went to Boston, New England in April 1636 and then to Lynn, Massachusetts where he was a minister from 1638 to 1679. He died there on 11 December 1679. His eldest son John Whiting was a rector at Leverton, Nottingham.

24. Steven Whiting Hatch stated that "Suffolk Emigrants" declares that the Whiting family came from Suffolk County, England in the vicinity of Basford. (There isn't a parish named Basford in Suffolk, but there is a parish named Boxford. A christening for a William, son of William and Elizabeth Whiting, was found in Aldringham parish dated 9 September 1600.). Holmes' "Dictionary of Ancestral Heads of New England Families" states he came from Boxford, Sussex. (There isn't a parish named Boxford in Sussex but there is a parish named Boxgrove.)

25. Two old undated, unsigned pieces of paper located by Evelyn W. Baird in 1998 while at the Connecticut Historical Society stated that William's wife Susanna was Susanna Wiggins. The researcher did not know the origin of this information.

26. "Whitings in England Before 1650" by Gordon C. Whiting (1978) poses that the most likely place of origin (due to William's nonconformity) is East Anglia (which can include Lincolnshire).

27. Gordon C. Whiting states that Miss M. Packman located the administration of William Whiting's estate in England (1648) and that he left "any and all English property" to his wife. Miss Packman also believes that William could be closely connected to the Whitings of Boxford and Hadleigh in Suffolk or to the Whitings of Boston (and Deptford, Kent) in Lincolnshire. Gordon Whiting states that the Whitings of Boston, Lincolnshire loaned money to the colony of Massachusetts. In Gordon's book are listings of Whitings by county that Miss Packman collected. Many are from Lincolnshire and London—two prime areas for William Whiting.

28. A family tree found on FamilyTreeMaker concerning the Descendants of John Whiting states that William Whiting was born in Boxford "Sussex" and died in 1647 in Hartford, Connecticut. His wife Susannah Wiggin was born in 1609 in Milford, Connecticut and married William in 1635 in Hartford. Also claims that William's son William was born in 1631 in Milford, Connecticut and his daughter Sarah was born in 1632 in the same place. This pedigree seems to contain multiple errors and speculation.

29. The coat of arms used by William Whiting Jr. matches perfectly with the description of the coat of arms used by the Giles Whiting family of Etton, Northamptonshire. Giles was the rector of Etton and died there in 1627. According to the burial entry for Giles' wife Margerie, the couple had 41 grandchildren by that year. Only 11 of these children were listed in the 1619 heraldic visitation for Leicester. Giles' sons John and Timothy and one of Timothy's sons were also clergymen with the Church of England. One of Giles' grandsons, Nathaniel Whiting, emigrated to Massachusetts about the same time as did William Whiting. Giles Whiting left a will in 1627 (Church of England. Consistory Court of the Diocese of Peterborough Probate records, 1541-1858 (Salt Lake City, Utah : Filmed by the Genealogical Society of Utah, 1958) (FHL British film 174844)). The will did not mention William, but it also did not name all of Giles' grandchildren. Giles Whiting's pedigree was also found in the 1634 visitation of Essex. Giles and his two sons who became clergymen are found in Henry Isham Longden's Northamptonshire and Rutland clergy from 1500 (Northampton, England : Archer & Goodman, 1938-1943) (FHL British book 942.5 D3L v. 15).

If true, this would place Thomas Wiggins' birth about 1592 and Catherine Whiting's birth about 1601. He was a widower when he married Catherine.
