



Ren Whiting was originally buried in the wheatfield of this farm. Uncle Will had the body moved to Pocatello at the Hayden's request.




08 DENNING HOMESTEAD

The Len Whiting family moved into the Pettit Place after Len sold his home to Ole Hatch. Its probably in September of 1920. Verona Pearl Whiting, the fourth child and second daugher was born in this log home with a shanty in October of that year, the day before Halloween.

Verne remembers his father bringing a snowshoe rabbit home and skinning it out on the inside of the door of the shanty. There was a well in the shanty. It snowed real deep in November. Pearl sang the "Daddy's gone a hunting to get a rabbit skin to rap the baby bunting in" when Verona was born. The Christmas spent in this house was the first Verne remembers

Later this building became the meeting house for the LDS Crystal Ward.

11 KELLOG PLACE

The Len Whiting family moved into the Kellog place in the spring of 1921. They lived here until 1931 when they moved to Salmon, Idaho because of about 7 years of drought .They had had very severe thunder and lightnings storms which would wash big gullies down through grain out. The community got together and prayed after which the storms stopped.

Emma Green's house was up Cherry Creek from the Kellog place and another house above hers was where the Jay Whiting family lived for a time. Their son broke his leg while living there. It took about 5 months for it to heal.

George Albert Whiting 6th child of Len and Pearl Whiting was the only child we know of who was born here.









Robin and Garden Creek

Father built a house, barn and such here (Garden Creek). We lived on the farm for a while. The people at Garden Creek were very friendly to us. They were all Mormons except Bert Evans. The rest of his family were Mormons.

They had an L.D.S. church house. No store nor post office. Dora Curts started a small store. Father and Mother bought the store and enlarged it. Mother, with the help of Bishop Capell started a post office. She named it Robin, Idaho. This was the first post office, and she had care for it for a number of years. Mary, her eleventh child was born while we lived there. Father still had his sawmill and farm. Of course he now had the help of the boys. He sometimes had to hire a few men to help with he sawmill. Maud was married by then and her husband, Josiah Marley, worked at the mill part time.

After we moved from Marsh Center to Robin, Father took my two oldest brothers, Lorenzo and Forres (nicknames: Len and Far), and went back to Hobble Creek Canyon to "fetch" the sawmill they had left behind. By the time they had returned with the mill, it was planting time. The crops in, Father and the boys went off in search of timber for the mill. They found a nice stand about twelve miles from Robin, in a canyon called Yellow Dog. From that time on, Father and the boys were practically never home any length of time, only long enough to plant and harvest crops. Father would try to be home Saturday nights, for he always tried hard to see to it that we were all in
